In the process of doing research in preparation for my presentation, I learned much about computer use and Internet connectivity in east Africa as well as the kinds of issues affecting students and teachers wishing to integrate computers into African classrooms.

Due to my overwhelmingly positive experiences at the Peace as a Global Language Conference, I definitely see myself returning to Nairobi. I would like to thank everyone at the Management University of Africa for helping to organize this conference and for making this unforgettable experience possible for everyone who took part.
